She lost her Mom to lung cancer at 10 years old, After living with her father for a year, he became addicted to narcotics then began selling drugs to support his kids as well as his habit. Their house was raided by the Providence Police Dept and the family was forever changed. They were taken from her Dad as he went to prison, then they entered DCYF care and the 5 younger siblings were split up between different aunts. Deanna eventually was placed in different group homes from the ages 14-17 due to issues she was having with her aunt. Once she turned 18, she went back to work for St. Mary's Home for Children in their Independent Living Program which was transformational. It was Deanna's way to give back to other kids in her same position.

Fast forward to her career at CFP, Deanna was able to start as a per diem Direct Care Staff while she finished the master's program at Johnson and Wales. Upon graduation, Deanna held several leadership positions at various programs at CFP in Rhode Island. Her favorite years of her foster residential career was the time she spent as Program Director because she felt that she was able to tailor the program from the eyes of a previous client.

Deanna holds a bachelor's and master's degree in criminal justice from Johnson and Wales University. She has two teen daughters, (Aaliyah and Laila), a 15-year-old dog (Blanco) whom she adores and recently married her husband Jose. She is a 6-year veteran with the Providence Police Department, and is currently serving in the Training Academy as an Instructor with her second class of recruits.
